




This response was received which may also be of interest to other Meridian/Westprint readers.

"Mandy and I (another Colin) attempted to do the full track in September last year, we were looking for an alternative track back east after driving the Anne Beadell track east to west earlier. We ran into some local young fellas not far from Israelites Bay who informed us the track was impassable after rain, it had been a bit wet leading up till then. We were travelling solo and they said a bunch of local lads in well prepared 4wd's had attempted to get through and got into a lot of difficulties and turned back, hence we determined that us travelling solo would not make it. Instead, we followed the Parmango track from Condingup through Deralinya homestead station (Roger lives at the homestead and welcomes visitors and likes to pass on info of the area, its history and what there is to see), Booanya Rock, then onto the old telegraph station near Balladonia.




What's New to the Website







A little bit of Australian towns trivia this week.

Australia is home to a myriad of unique towns, each offering its own slice of history, culture, and natural beauty.

❖ The longest place name belongs to Mamungkukumpurangkuntjunya Hill in South Australia. It is in the Everard Ranges, about 22 km south-west of Mimili. The name consists of several Pitjantjatjara words made into one. It roughly means "where a devil urinates"



❖ 1770 – the town that has a number for its name. This tiny town is nestled between the Coral Sea and Bustard Bay, known for its historical significance as the second landing site of Captain James Cook and the Endeavour crew in May 1770. Originally named Round Hill after the nearby creek, the town was renamed in 1970 to commemorate the bicentennial of Cook's visit. Today, it stands as a significant landmark in Australian history, reflecting its pivotal role in Captain Cook's exploration of the continent.



Widely regarded as the most remote community is Kiwirrkurra. It is situated in the sandhill region of the Gibson Desert, southwest of Lake McKay in the Northern Territory. The residents of Kiwirrkurra predominantly speak Pintupi, although many have familial connections with residents of other Ngaanyatjarra communities. In 1988, Kiwirrkurra Community officially joined the Ngaanyatjarra Council, solidifying its affiliation with neighbouring communities in the region.



❖ Cooladdi In Queensland is thought to be the country's smallest town. Cooladdi was once a thriving railway town, but when the rail connection closed the residents slowly drifted away. The 2021 census listed the population for Cooladdi as 7.



William Creek is a tiny outback town, found on the world's largest cattle station. The 32,500-square-kilometre Anna Creek Station is Australia's largest pastoral property and is located halfway point between Oodnadatta and Marree.



❖ The Hay Plains In New South Wales are world-renowned as the flattest place in the southern hemisphere and the third flattest place in the world. There's just 17 metres difference between the lowest and highest points on the plains.



❖ Marble Bar in Western Australia has held the title of Australia's hottest town since 1924. It etched its name into the history books with its record-breaking heatwave from October 31, 1923, to April 7, 1924, with the longest heatwave ever recorded anywhere in the world. For 160 consecutive days, temperatures soared above 100 degrees 37.8 degrees Celsius. Notably, Marble Bar's record for the hottest days was set in January 1905 and January 1922, when the temperature reached a sweltering 49.2 degrees Celsius.



❖ Liawenee is a small town in the central highlands of Tasmania. It is a Tasmanian Indigenous name that means 'frigid' which is apt as Liawenee is classed as one of the coldest permanently inhabited places in Australia. Temperatures range from 5C to 18C in summer and between -2C and 6C during winter although its record low was -14.2 Celsius set in 2020.



Hobart in Tasmania is home to the Hope and Anchor Hotel. Established in 1807, this pub claims to be the oldest continuously licensed pub in Australia.



Melbourne is home to the oldest railway station. Flinders Station was opened in 1854 and was a collection of weatherboard train sheds. The station was eventually rebuilt and today, Flinders Street Station, with its prominent green copper dome, distinctive yellow facade, arched entrance, tower, and clocks, is also one of Melbourne's most recognisable landmarks.






