A couple of editions ago, we had a reader's query about Nuytsland Reserve which is a campground in Cocklebiddy, Western Australia

We just received another reply from Bruce and thought we would publish for anyone who might be interested.

"Finally found some notes and gps wpts relating to this portion. In early March this year I tried to reach Twilight Cove [beach closest to Cocklebiddy] from the Eyre Bird observatory but failed to make it as the track was totally blown out so I didn't persevere. Track changes due to wind and fire.

Notes start at the Baxter cliffs at Twilight Cove. Haven't used this section in some time and last time there were new sections opened in places and these notes do not reflect these changes.

"For your info, we recently did an Outback Spirit tour down the Canning. We had travelled up the CSR on a tag-a-long tour in 2004. Over the 20 years' timeframe, a lot of the unrestored wells have deteriorated a lot and even the restored wells are showing signs of needing some care. A Peregrine near Durba Springs, corrugated track "out there" and then Well 6 (holding up well)."

Freycinet National Park in Tasmania. Due to a severe weather warning, the following tracks will be closed from 27 August until further notice as a precautionary measure: Mount Amos track, Cape Tourville track and Mount Freycinet and Mount Graham track. Campsites and all other tracks including the Wineglass Bay lookout will remain open.

The new Tomaree Coastal Walk is now open on the coast of Port Stephens in NSW. This is a 27 km multi-day walk along the coastline of Tomaree National Park, starting at Tomaree Head at Shoal Bay and finishing at Birubi Point Aboriginal Place at Anna Bay.

The Whipstick Loop in the Wombat State Forst has reopened following severe storm damage in 2021. The walk has reopened and a new bridge has been installed at the start of the loop.

Burke's Grave in Innamincka Regional Reserve is now open to 4WD.

Boulia – Dajarra Rd, Dajarra – Mt Isa, Boulia – Winton, Boulia – Bedourie and Boulia – Queensland Border – roads are currently open to all vehicles.



Anne Beadell Highway

The Anne Beadell Highway is an awe-inspiring 1,325 km route that passes through extremely remote desert areas of Western Australia.




Shortly after surveying the site for the Woomera township and range facilities, Len Beadell was asked to find a remote location for the detonation of atomic bombs and other nuclear weapons. The site needed to be remote from public access, as well as being away from the proposed centre line of fire of the rocket range. Beadell's initial explorations led him to Dingo Claypan as the ideal site to land supplies and personnel for these tests, however this was too close to the centre of fire, being only a few kilometres from the 300 mile post.

Subsequent sites were explored and eventually a site for a works area and small village was located at Emu Claypan. The test sites were situated about 20 kilometres to the south east of Emu Village. Once this site was chosen a road was needed to transport the heavy equipment and personnel required to establish the test facilities. The remainder of the Anne Beadell Highway was built in various stages.



Work on the first section of this road from Mabel Creek Station to Emu was commenced by Australian Defence Forces, following Len Beadell's wheel tracks to Emu, as part of the Woomera Rocket Range network of roads. This road from Mabel Creek Station to Emu was constructed in early 1953 and was later to become known as the Anne Beadell Highway, named for Len Beadell's wife.

The second section of the Anne Beadell Highway from Emu to Annes Corner was built in 1957 to link the newly constructed Mt Davies Road to the Maralinga- Emu Road.



The next section, from Annes Corner to Voakes Hill Corner was built in 1961. The last section of the Anne Beadell Highway, westward from Voakes Hill Corner was completed in November 1962.

Despite, its name, it is important to note that the Anne Beadell Highway is an outback unsealed track carved through some of the most isolated and harsh areas in Australia. Road conditions along the Anne Beadell Highway vary significantly and the track is notoriously rough, with corrugations, washouts, and soft sand sections.

It is also necessary to organise a number of permits to travel along the highway. The Cosmo Newberry Reserve on the Western Australian side of the track allows for transit through the area. Permits are also required for travel though the area within South Australia. including to transit through the Tallaringa Conservation Park and Mumungari Conservation Park which are administered by South Australia National Parks.





Another permit covers the Maralinga Lands - as Defence periodically conducts testing in the desert, there are exclusion periods where permits aren't issued. This is because Defence uses the Woomera Area for military capability and 'weapons testing. To make sure these tests are safe and secure, there are times that Defence will require non-defence users such as permit holders and other people to evacuate the area.



Approval to access this area is suspended during these periods that are called Exclusion Periods. These exclusion zones occur several times throughout the year and are widely advertised on the defence website (https://www.defence.gov.au/bases-locations/sa/woomera/access/exclusion-

periods) or in the Desert Parks Pass published by the National Parks and Wildlife Services of South Australia (https://www.parks.sa.gov.au/book-and-pay/desert-parks-pass).





The track itself is a combination of firm sand but heavy and sustained rainfalls can cause washouts significant road pavement damage to the Anne Beadell Highway making it unpassable during these times.

The Anne Beadell Highway traverses some very remote terrain and, at times, there can be fairly limited traffic on the road. In fact, there are no settlements between Coober Pedy and Laverton. In 2003, the Ilkurlka Roadhouse opened This initiative of the Spinifex people, is 167 kilometres west of the Western Australia – South Australian state border. While the Ilkurlka Roadhouse offers essential services to travellers on the Anne Beadell Highway, including travel updates, its primary function is to support the communities to the north and south during times of Aboriginal business and travel.



Despite its challenging conditions, the Anne Beadell Highway offers several points of interest that make the journey rewarding. These include:

Emu Field: Site of the first British atomic tests in Australia, Emu Field is an eerie reminder of the country's involvement in nuclear testing. The remains of the test site, including concrete markers and craters, can still be seen today.




Vokes Hill Corner: This is one of the key junctions along the route, where the Anne Beadell Highway intersects with other tracks. It's a popular camping spot for travellers to rest and regroup.

Neale Junction: Another significant intersection, Neale Junction is where the Anne Beadell Highway crosses the Connie Sue Highway. Named after Len Beadell's daughter, this spot is marked by a plaque commemorating Beadell's work.

Yeo Lake Nature Reserve: Located towards the western end of the track, Yeo Lake offers a rare opportunity to see a variety of wildlife and bird species in an otherwise harsh environment.



The Anne Beadell Highway is more than just a road; it's a passage through history, culture, and some of the most spectacularly remote landscapes on the planet. For those willing to take on the challenge, it offers a unique adventure and a chance to experience the true spirit of the Australian outback. Whether it's the thrill of navigating one of the world's most isolated tracks or the opportunity to connect with the rich heritage of the land, the Anne Beadell Highway remains a testament to human determination and the enduring allure of the wild frontier.
