The Ivanhoe Crossing over the Ord River in Western Australia is now open. Care needs to be taken when crossing as this crossing can be dangerous due to slippery surfaces, fast-flowing water, and the presence of both fresh and saltwater Crocodiles.

Montezuma Track in Tasmania is closed until further notice due to severe storm damage.

Cape York 4WD Road Queensland has reopened, subject to weather conditions, following repairs caused by Cyclone Jasper.

The Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service will be conducting foothold trapping activities in Southend Conservation Park between 9 – 18 October. These activities are conducted to reduce impacts on turtle nests from predation by feral animals. The whole Park will be closed to the public.

Bunda Cliffs Camping area in South Australia is permanently closed as it poses significant safety risks to the public. Parks has given advice again that this area part of the Nullarbor Wilderness Protection Area is unstable. The cliff edge is constantly collapsing into the ocean. Tracks along the Cliffs are also not accessible as many have cracks and prone to collapse.

Parks Victoria are continuing deer control in the Dandenong Ranges National Park. This program will be taking place between the hours of 4pm and 7am on a number of nights between August 14, 2024, and December 6, 2024. Various areas of the park will be inaccessible during the evening throughout this period. Signage will be in place at access points when control activities are occurring.

The Top End

Visiting the Top End had long been on our bucket list. We had managed to visit Central Australia with our children when they were quite young making it as far as Alice Springs. Our children have since grown up and left home which gives some idea as to how long it has been to realise the dream of this trip.

We landed in Darwin with the plan of picking up a hire car and travel Darwin – Kakadu – Katherine – Litchfield – Darwin. I really was not aware of what a spectacle of nature, culture and history was waiting for us.

There were so many highlights of the trip. From the diverse landscapes and indigenous culture of Kakadu National Park, the water holes and waterfalls of Litchfield, the serenity and splendour of Katherine Gorge there was something more stunning to enjoy each day.

We traded 7 degrees and cloudy skies for 37 degrees and stunning sunsets. Ubirr is a rocky outcrop in Kakadu National Park and is home to some exceptional indigenous rock art. Climbing to the top of Ubirr affords you amazing views over the floodplains and a relaxing place to marvel at the sunset.






The rock art at Ubirr depict a variety of subjects, including animals, ancestral beings, and hunting scenes, reflecting the spiritual beliefs and traditional practices of the local Indigenous people. However, we were treated to a real spectacle of rock art on a trip to Arnhem Land. You can only enter Arnhem Land on a guided tour. We were able to get up close and personal to the art work and hear the stories and history associated with the various drawings.











Cahills Crossing is a famous river crossing in Kakadu National Park, located near the East Alligator River at the entrance to Arnhem Land and is known for its saltwater crocodiles.









Billabongs, walking trails, and lookouts were all part of a day's adventure in Kakadu.










Katherine Gorge Katherine is located within Nitmiluk National Park, is a stunning natural wonder characterized by its cliffs and crystal-clear waters, serenity and beauty. We enjoyed a boat tour through three of the gorges and then enjoyed a swim in one of the rock pools. You couldn't imagine a more picturesque backdrop.















Litchfield National Park is characterised by stunning waterholes and waterfalls such as Wangi Falls, Buley Rockhole, Tolmer Falls as well as the termite mounds which more resembled something you would see in a cemetery than in a national park!
