As I write this, the exact extent of damage, flooding and closures from ex tropical cyclone Alfred are being played out. Flood warnings were active from the Sunshine Coast to Lismore. Thousands of homes and businesses were without power in south-east Queensland and northern NSW. Authorities were also wary of potential flooding in south-east Queensland and northern New

South Wales. Even though Brisbane was relatively spared compared to surrounding areas, it still faced heavy rainfall and potential flash floodings. If you have plans to be in these areas in the near future, please be cognisant of the dangers of flood waters and the real possibility that areas are cut off. Please remember to check local websites as closures are likely to change.

The Queensland Department of Environment, Tourism, Science and Innovation is advising that now is not the time to visit national parks and recreation areas impacted by Tropical Cyclone Alfred. Severe weather conditions continue, with gale-force winds, large tides, and ocean swells affecting many island and coastal parks. Entering closed areas is illegal and can result in a \$645 fine. The advice is to stay out of closed parks while Rangers carry out clean-up and repair work as quickly as possible. Check their websites for regular updates.

Munga-Thirri Simpson Desert, PAR No 15 K1 Warburton, PAR No 16 Walkers Crossing, PAR No 2 Level Post Bay, PAR No 13 Halligan Bay Point are due to re-open on 16 March 2025. Please check website for latest updates.



# Forty Miles of Bad Road Part 2

#### Alice to Broome

Len's vehicle is booked in for a service in the morning and we leave Alice after lunch. We're tackling the Tanami Track one of Australia's longest and loneliest dirt roads across the dry expanses of the inland, from Alice Springs to Halls Creek.





We first sail along 200kms of bitumen before we hit the dirt road and it's the time of day now to make camp. We have been led to believe that we are allowed 50m from the entire of the road for the length of the track. Plenty far enough for a camp.



In the morning, we start off again on the dirt track and from here on we're really in the desert. It appears that to make this road, a dozer and grader have simply run across the countryside and pushed to one side the larger rocks. The rolling hills are simply sand and rocks. Over one rise we come upon a bloke on a camel with another bloke leading it. What the hell are they doing out here? They're actually doing a trek, trying to raise money for cancer research. We gave them a donation...and think there must be other ways...



Comes lunchtime and where do we stop? There's just sand and rocks, no trees, no shade, no cars, no birds, no anything. We just pull up on the edge of the track and have lunch. We're each carrying 20 litres of extra fuel and we put it into our tanks. That's probably the best place to carry it. We're yet to change our clocks to central time. We weren't in Alice long enough to make a difference and we're heading to Western Australia. So, I suggested we go back one hour now and one hour when we get to the end of the Tanami, rather than take a two-hour hit on one day.

There are not many stops along the route and we pass the turn off to Tilmouth Well and then on to Yuendumu. This is a large Aboriginal community and we thought we'd visit, but we are deterred by a big sign at the turn off. Apparently a "dry" community, the sign says there are huge fines, even confiscation of vehicles and jail time for even bringing alcohol into the place. Wow! Under the tarp on my wagon, half my load is beer for me and Len. And then there's the bottle of Scotch and another of Baileys. I'm not going in there!

So, we stayed on the track and carried on. There are termite mounds everywhere and a particularly large one is right by the roadside. Time for a photo.



And we saw brumbies all looking fit and healthy. We wonder what they can find out here to eat. According to our maps it is just over 300kms to the roadhouse at Rabbit Flat, and that's our target. But well before we get there we find a major intersection and a well-worn track leading off. We read the signs. "The Granite Mines." We are literally miles from anywhere. It makes you wonder who found what? And how did they find it way out here? After the turn off the track deteriorates. Maybe the mine helps with the track maintenance back to Alice. Either way, it was less maintained after the mines (is this where those other vehicles shook to bits?)

We know we're getting close to Rabbit Flat because we were starting to see garbage on the roadside. The closer we get, the more there is. We arrive at the "roadhouse". What a sad portrayal of life in the Australian outback. The building looks like a jail, with steel bars and wire mesh on every window and door. Inside, from the serving counter to the ceiling is barred and meshed with a small opening at the centre of the counter just big enough to slide a case of beer through. The man and woman serving in the dingy interior appear like moles in a hole. Outside we unlock the fuel bowser which is so old that it doesn't cater for a fuel price over \$1. We need to double the price that the

meter reads. It's \$1.26 for diesel. (Please note: The Rabbit Flat Road House closed in 2010 after 41 years in business.)



The morning broke bright and sunny and after breaking camp we went back to the roadhouse and bought stubby holders as a memento of Australia's most remote roadhouse.

Back on the track and we pass another mine turn off, the Tanami Mine. Another 100kms and we arrive at the West Australian border where we remembered to turn our clocks back another hour. We are now on Australian Western Standard Time (AWST). As the track curls around to the north, there is a turn off to the south to the community of Balgo. The community recently became famous as the rest of the world became aware of the quality of painting and other art that is produced in this remote area. Further on there is another turn off to the left. This is the famous, or infamous, Canning Stock Route, designed to follow a series of wells for the purpose of taking stock from the grazing lands of the Kimberleys to the markets in the south.



We soon take the turn to Wolfe Creek Crater. This is the site where a meteor came to Earth. It was a long time ago, but it is still one of the larger meteors known to have hit the planet. We climb the rim and look down into the crater. Strange rocks lay about the ground, having been melted by the enormous impact. Inside the crater, the lower flat area, slowly filling over time, has a slightly different ecosystem to the surrounding plains and the rim we stand on is perfectly round. After a further 20kms we make camp on the creek, Wolfe Creek.



We leave camp from Wolfe Creek and after a further 100kms we hit the bitumen. We have done the Tanami and came out the other end unscathed (not like some). 1050 kms from Alice to Halls Creek with only 220kms of bitumen. Quite a trek...quite an experience.

We turn right and run the 15kms into Halls Creek for fuel and lunch. Then to Fitzroy Crossing where we pulled into a caravan park for the night. It was here we saw out first Boab tree. We stopped next at Geiki Gorge and the weather being quite warm, we all enjoyed a swim in the cool waters.

Broome is our western destination and we are almost there when we see a roadside sign advertising bananas. We'll have a look. Down a dirt track and we find a small cabin, a young couple with a baby and a small plantation. The story was that these newly weds were from the Woolgoolga area and from banana growing families. They were travelling and noticed that the bananas were not available in Broome. They decided to have a go themselves at growing them locally. They had bananas for sale, so were doing something right. We wished them luck.

Len reckoned he smelled salt water 50kms back and we finally got to see it. The Indian Ocean. We hit town at about 5 o'clock, booked into a cabin and went straight to Cable Beach for a swim. And here's another milestone. It was on Cable Beach that we drank our last stubby of brown beer that I had carted all the way from home. Symbolically from east to west. I can remember a

documentary made by the Leyland Brothers who symbolically took a bottle of water from the Pacific Ocean across the continent and poured it into the Indian Ocean. We'd done something similar only with a different kind of liquid.

We did the rounds of Broome. We drove along Cable Beach again to the nude section and exercised our eyeballs, we drove around Gantheaume Point lighthouse and saw the dinosaur prints in the rocks.



We drove on the headland and saw all the bright colours in the sand and to the new jetty where cattle were being loaded. A bloke was spearing crabs and a hovercraft was travelling around the shore. We saw pearl shell jewellery that was worked on by a lady in a shop and her husband lived on a yacht. Elaine tried on a necklace worth \$28,000 then a \$4000 one but bought neither. But she did buy a \$5 t-shirt. We'd had a good look at Broome and there was only one thing to do before heading out...visit the grog shop.

The General said, "I believe that forgiving them is God's function... OUR job is to arrange the meeting."




