




Meridian Musings

I've recently been struck by the irony of how the same floods that caused such devastation in Queensland are now breathing life into Kati Thanda—Lake Eyre. Although the lake hasn't been completely dry in years, the amount of water flowing through the channels and rivers that feed into the lake should be enough to fill it - a phenomenon that last occurred in 1999-2001 and before that in the historic flooding of 1974. My Memories of Pushing Goog's Track - \$30.00

Goog's Track is a legendary 120-kilometre 4WD-only route that carves its way through the remote, red-sand landscapes of South Australia's Yellabinna Conservation Park. Beginning at the dog-proof fence just north of Lone Oak—about 40 kilometres from Ceduna—and stretching to the Trans-Australia railway, the track rolls over 363 east—west sand dunes. Often described as a "mini Simpson Desert crossing," it's a rite of passage for off-road enthusiasts. In this captivating memoir, Jenny Denton—Goog's widow—shares the remarkable tale of how the track came to be. With warmth, humour, and heartfelt honesty, she recounts the trials, triumphs, and sheer determination that fuelled their four-year mission to carve a road through the wild. 





Title: Road Trips Australia: Backroads and Byways

Road Trips Australia: Backroads and Byways is a gorgeous book filled with stunning full colour photos and handy sections of maps for every road trip.

The book is laid out by region, covering all of Australia's States and Territories except the Australian Capital Territory. This wide coverage means that there is something for everyone—whether you are looking for trips close to home or want to explore a completely new part of the country.

Australia's huge network of roads and highways makes it a dream destination for road trip enthusiasts. This book is perfect for those who love self guided adventures and enjoy straying from the main roads. It doesn't aim to list every stop along the way but instead highlights the most scenic routes, charming small towns, and unique experiences. It's all about going beyond the usual tourist spots and really connecting with the landscapes, history, and culture that help make Australia so special.

Each road trip focuses on a specific region, with carefully chosen backroads and byways that capture its unique character. The itineraries are easy to follow and include distances, travel times, and suggested stops. There are also tips on road conditions, the best times to visit, and what type of vehicle you'll need—so you will feel prepared before hitting the road. The focus on small towns, local cafes, and hidden gems adds a personal touch, while mentions of historical sites, Indigenous heritage, and local traditions give the trips extra depth.

I found the Victorian itineraries particularly interesting since it is my home State. The Mallee Country itinerary (p. 120) felt especially familiar because it is so similar to a road trip we did last year. Reading it brought back memories of all the fun we had and helped me relive that trip. It's clear that Don Fuchs actually went on this trip himself, which makes the details feel really authentic.

The friendly, conversational tone of the book makes it an enjoyable read. There's something for everyone here, and I loved how it included website links for easy access to extra information. This provided the opportunity to research further details and places to explore

The itineraries are presented as flexible guides rather than fixed plans, which is great if you like to tweak and personalize your trips. This approach encourages you to take the ideas in the book and build your own unique adventure. However, since the focus is on backroads and byways, you will need to look elsewhere if you are after urban specific travel tips.


The maps in *Road Trips Australia* are great for planning and getting a general idea of the routes, but you might want to use more detailed maps while you're on the road

All in all, I think this book is an amazing resource that will inspire you to explore Australia's lesser known areas with its practical advice, detailed itineraries, and focus on hidden gems. I know it has given me the inspiration for planning our next road trip.

Whether you're a seasoned traveller or just hitting the road occasionally, *Australia's Great Thermal Way* offers a wealth of options for a relaxing dip across the country.

When the book first arrived at Meridian Maps, we were genuinely impressed by how comprehensive and user-friendly it is—a perfect guide for winding down after a day of travel. Covering 67 thermal pools across all states and the Northern Territory, the book highlights the incredible diversity of these natural wonders. From soaking in the Artesian Mud Baths at Eulo (QLD), to drifting through the warm 34°C waters of Bitter Springs in Mataranka (NT), to indulging in the spa rooms at Hepburn Bathhouse and Spa (VIC), there's something here for everyone.

Inside the front and back covers, you'll find a detailed map marking each thermal pool mentioned in the book. Each region is colour-coded for easy navigation. Every location includes a photo and description, with many entries enriched by "History Notes" and background information to enhance your visit.

The guide was inspired by Steve Lambert's visit to Innot Hot Springs in 2007, during one of his around-Australia adventures. Since then, it has evolved into more than just a location guide—it includes insightful information on artesian basins, geothermal water use, towing tips, and even some fantastic recipes at the back.

This book is a must have for any traveller keen to discover one of Australia's lesser-known natural treasures. Try to visit them all—tick them off as you go and enjoy the journey!

"That's a great idea!" says Einstein. "Let's switch places then!"


