Outback Road Builders – Opening up the Strzelecki Track and the Cooper Basin - \$37.50

At sixteen, **Gordon Wooton** joined the Engineering & Water Supply Department's road gang in Burra, South Australia. It was 1958 — the year the State Premier promised Delhi Santos that roads would be built to reach the remote Cooper Basin if they explored for oil and gas. Gordon and the Burra

Gang were assigned to construct a route up the Strzelecki Track to Innamincka and across the Cooper Basin. From Blanchwater to Mount Hopeless, through the Cobler Sand Hills and along Strzelecki Creek, they built the roads that allowed access to the region for exploration and industry. Working under extreme heat, sandstorms, and remote conditions, these men developed strong camaraderie and left a lasting legacy. *Outback Road Builders* is Gordon's firsthand account of those years, documenting the challenges, work processes, and experiences of building roads in one of Australia's most remote regions. The book includes rare photographs from the time, providing a record of the roads, landscapes, and conditions faced by the road builders in the Cooper Basin.

Progress is important, and good roads and rail lines are essential — but should it come at the expense of preserving the history of our small outback towns? What do you think? Have you discovered towns like Cook on your travels around Australia?

Access to Cook

In 2012 Tim and I travelled from Perth to Adelaide on the Indian Pacific. Despite what some people might think, for us there was nothing Nullar-Boring about it for, as long as it was light, we sat with our eyes glued to the window the whole way. The fare included a stop at Cook, not for an outdoor meal but just a wander around the little community/town where, in 2012, only 4 people resided.

In 2023 we crossed the Nullarbor again, but this time in our campervan. We wanted to revisit Cook as we hoped it was being loved and maintained as an important part of Australian history should be. As we left the Eyre Highway there was a sign advising that it was 105 kilometres to Cook where there are "No Services".




Historical Marker

Our expectations were high as we turned north from Eyre Highway. Half way along the track we were treated to the sight of 2 bustards. They were unusually bold, for they stood in our pathway for 5 minutes or more and allowed us to admire them. When we had seen them in the past they had never lingered so it seemed like a good omen. Ahead we could see the buildings of Cook, as we got closer, we became increasing aware that we would not be welcome there. A few hundred metres from the line there were unfriendly signs warning against unauthorised entry. "Pacific National access only". However, it was late in the afternoon and having travelled up from the highway, we were not wanting to go back in the gathering twilight. As is the nature of the area, there were no sheltering trees, so we just pulled off the track half a kilometre away, feeling somewhat exposed. We could see people in hi-vis clothing moving around and they must have been able to see us. However, no-one came and asked us to move on, so we had an undisturbed night.

The next morning two trucks came away from the buildings, heading south towards the highway. I gave them a friendly wave and in return they stopped to say good morning. I told them we had wanted to revisit Cook but had been put off by the authoritative signs. The workers dismissed our concerns and told us to go ahead and have a look, only telling us to keep away from the tracks. Once there, we discovered that the condition of the town was no better than at our last visit – probably worse. The information boards were more faded and crumbling and the buildings were in a very sad state. It was no wonder that dongas were provided for the railway workers as the building were unliveable. We were saddened by the whole experience.



Yes, there are plenty of sites on the internet that tell that story but actually visiting the place helps bring the story alive and encourages visitors to understand the way in which the railway and these now almost non-existent towns played such an important role in the history of our country.



Our feeling is that of shame that Pacific National does not recognise the importance of Australians and international visitors learning our history and seeing it for themselves. I understand that Pacific National is a large company

whose main objective is that of ensuring the smooth running of passenger and freight trains across the country – and yes, that is an important function, but it seems the company has been given exclusive access to property which is of interest to the public. The "Do not enter" signs seem severe and unnecessary - if people travelling by train are allowed to set foot in Cook, why not others who have taken the effort to make the drive? Maybe marking out a designated camp area for self-contained vehicles, in a safe location not adjacent to the tracks, would be possible, and could be promoted as Pacific National supporting the wider community.




When we arrived back in Perth I decided to do something about it. I wrote 2 letters expressing our concern that this heritage town was so neglected and, that as a consequence, the significance of this town to the growth of Australia and the stories it has to tell, would likely disappear in a few more years. One letter to Heritage South Australia received a polite reply that said nothing more than "Your email has been received and will be actioned accordingly". The letter to the CEO of the Pacific National Railway received no reply. A few weeks later I sent a follow up letter but still no reply.

So there it is. Unless something has changed in the last 2 years, this interesting little town is gradually disappearing from view, and its stories are going with it. And my feeling is that anyone who should care, actually does not.

"Tablet?"


"Nope, I have none of those things. As a matter of fact, I don't even have a telephone".
